Dear Clay County Community,

It is my pleasure to present to you the 2018 – 2019 annual report for the Florida Department of Health in Clay County (DOH-Clay). This annual report highlights our accomplishments and services from the past fiscal year. DOH-Clay provides services to Clay County residents through health education, school health services, WIC and clinical based services. We are a safety net for vulnerable and underserved populations and our essential services are an asset to a healthy community which include immunizations, emergency preparedness, environmental health services and disease prevention and control. These services are utilized regularly by our residents to sustain and improve the health of Clay County. We cannot do this work without our

community partners who we collaborate with regularly to improve health efficiently and effectively for our residents.

Some of our highlights from last year:

- ◆ Deployment of 12 staff in response to Hurricane Michael in the panhandle to provide support to staff at other county health departments.
- ◆ Back to School Immunization rush at our clinic where we provided a total of 463 required forms for school (680s), 726 vaccinations and saw 864 students at the clinic for services.
- ◆ Completed our Community Health Assessment (CHA) to gain insight and feedback from Clay County residents on areas of improvement for their overall health; the three areas identified were Behavioral and Mental Health, Healthcare Access and Disease Prevention & Lifestyle Behaviors.
- ◆ Participated and hosted community events, trainings and health fairs to encourage our residents to live healthy lives.

This annual report shows the contributions we have made to improve the health of Clay County residents through our various programs and services. I would especially like to thank our community partners, particularly those that worked with us on our Community Health Assessment (CHA) and the Infant Mortality Taskforce to improve the public health of our community and to the Board of County Commissioners for their continued financial support. And lastly, to the staff of the Florida Department of Health in Clay County, for their continued dedication, support and diligent efforts to serve our community.

As we continue into the new fiscal year, we look forward to our finalized Strategic Plan which aligns our goals with the state and to strengthen our workforce development plan to ensure a strong public health workforce through the coming generations. We will continue working with our community partners to improve health in all places including where we live, work and play. At DOH-Clay, we strive for Health in all Places specifically in our economic, physical, social and service environments as we help ensure opportunities for health and support healthy behaviors. To achieve this, DOH-Clay will work with those who are best positioned to create policies and practices that promote healthy lifestyles in the community and environment.

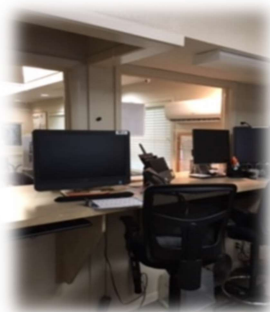
Facilities

- ◆ New Dodge Journeys (3) added to the fleet to replace three aging vehicles.



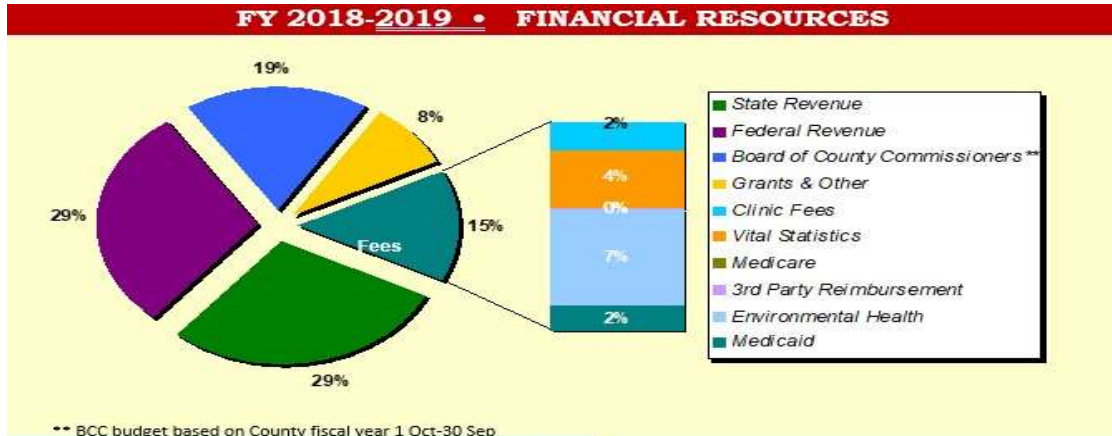
New services windows at the Bear Run Clinic

Fiscal & Budget

The Florida Department of Health in Clay County is a state agency that relies on federal, state and local county government funding to help support our public health programs and services. We receive additional revenue through contracts and grants, state and county fees, as well as payments from Medicaid programs.



DOH-Clay provides birth and death certificates for residents.

We have interfaced with VitalChek.Com to accept credit card orders for birth and death certificates and offer overnight delivery.

The following new business practices were instituted:

- ◆ WORKS is the new web-based system from Bank of America for PCard payment management.
- ◆ The Statewide Travel Management System (STMS) is the new paperless travel reimbursement system. STMS is all electronic and was designed to process travel advances and travel authorizations.
- ◆ Budgets are now developed and monitored by the program managers in an electronic budget module on a quarterly basis. This allows for accountability of our fiduciary responsibilities.

Clinical Services

School Health

The goal of the School Health Services Program is to ensure that students are healthy, in school, and ready to learn. Services are provided in accordance with the local Health Services Plan which is jointly developed, biennially, by the Florida Department of Health (DOH) in Clay County, the Clay County School District, and the School Health Wellness Advisory Council (SHWAC).

The School Health Services Program (F.S. 381.0056) provides basic health school services to all the students in the 43 public-schools in Clay County. In addition, DOH – Clay - School Health team collaborates with the 30 private schools in Clay County, ensuring school health entry requirements are met, as well as assisting with mandatory health screenings, as requested.

Health Screening Results 2018-2019

Vision, hearing, scoliosis and growth and development screenings are conducted in accordance with Florida Statutes 381.0056. Vision and hearing impairment directly interfere with the learning process and are often detected during school screenings. A plan for follow-up is an essential component of the screening program. To comply with the 2018-2019 Scope of Work deliverables, three attempts for follow-up are conducted, as needed, to notify the parent of any suspected abnormalities.

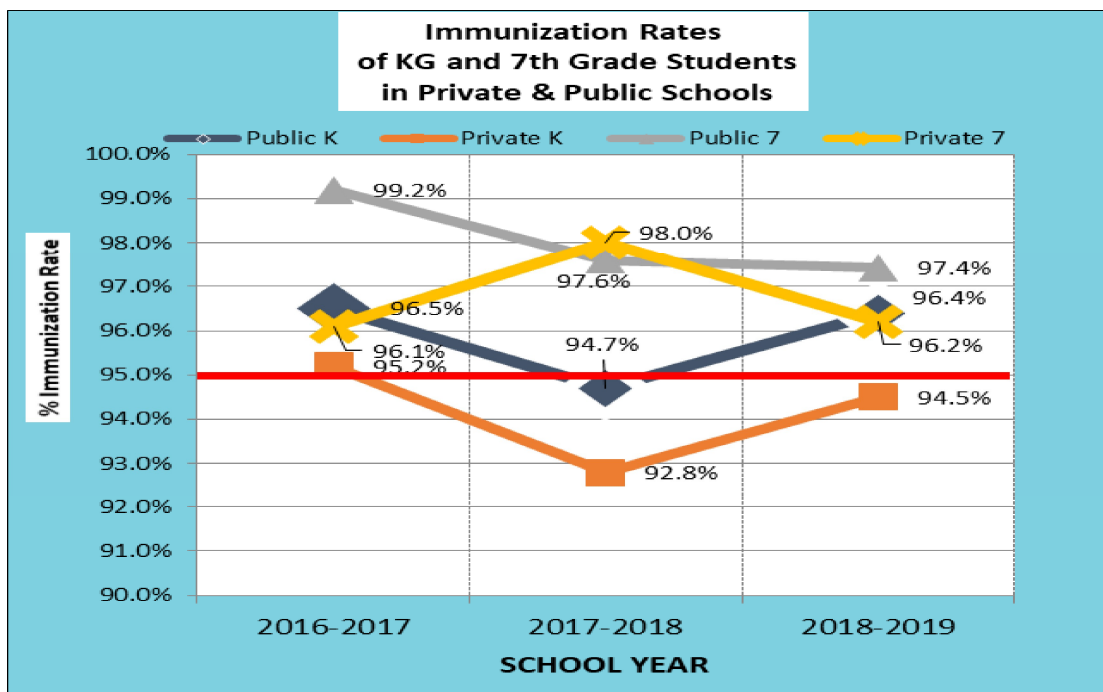

Immunization Compliance in Clay County Schools

Florida's immunization compliance goal of 95 percent of students meeting requirements, was met for SY 2018-2019 for 7th grade students in public and private schools and KG students in public schools. Although immunization compliance for KG students in private schools was not met, the rate increased from 92.8% in SY 2017-2018 to 94.5% in SY 2018-2019.

The School Health Team is implementing action steps, so all Clay County Schools will achieve or exceed the 95 percent state goal of KG and 7th grade students receiving all required immunizations upon school entry for SY 2019/2020. School health records are audited during school visits, to ensure school entry requirements are complying with Florida Statutes 1003.22.



Disease Prevention & Control

DOH-Clay provides testing and/or treatment services to persons infected with or suspected of being infected with an STD, to reduce the incidence of STD infections and prevent the development of disease related complications through early identification and treatment.

This past year, the STD program completed 28 outreach events and 15 individual provider visits in an effort to educate community partners and the public.

Tuberculosis (TB) Control Program

DOH-Clay provides a coordinated system of care for those persons identified to be at risk of contracting active TB and/or those persons with active TB and their close contacts.

Services include, but are not limited to, risk assessment and screening for TB, diagnosis of TB, and medical management of TB.

Vaccines required for school entry and recommended by the CDC are provided through the Vaccine for Children Program (VFC) from birth to 19 years of age.

Program 17 provides financially eligible uninsured or underinsured adults no cost vaccines.

For those patients insured or not eligible for Program 17, there are a limited number of vaccines available at cost.

Flu vaccines are available for established clients through January. Afterwards, the flu vaccines is available to the public.

Sexually Transmitted Diseases

STD screening and treatment is available by walk-in or appointments. Payment is requested at the time of service, but clients may be billed if unable to pay. Individuals who are contacts to a sexually transmitted disease may be screened and treated at no cost.

All individuals are informed of availability of HIV post exposure prophylaxis (PrEP). Persons who test positive for HIV are invited to start treatment immediately through our Test and Treat Program. Condoms are available as a no cost self-service item.

Community Health Education:

Reaching the community as a whole to ensure health equity is an important part of community health. We offered services to areas that normally do not have access. Healthiest Weight

The Florida Department of Health' **Healthiest Weight Initiatives** continues to improve the lifestyles of several Clay County youth and adults through improved physical activity and nutrition education. The awareness of living a healthier lifestyle does present many challenges for residents but through continued partnerships with other organizations we hope to combat the obesity epidemic and to foster environmental changes. Healthiest Weight partners with local government, school district, hospitals, and non-governmental agencies.

Every Kid Healthy Week

The DOH-Clay and School Health Program partnered with the Clay County School District, Orange Park Medical Center and Safe Routes to School Program to provide a fun-filled day of learning about healthy behaviors and physical activity. This year's Every Kid Healthy Week event took place on Friday, May 17, 2019 at Grove Park Elementary (GPE). The students rotated through stations such as "My Plate Relay", Bike Helmet Fitting, Tug-o-War, Over/Under Relay, Hole-In-A-Cup Relay, and finally a Bounce House. The Bike Helmet Fitting station was able to provide 134 helmets and safety education to students at the event.

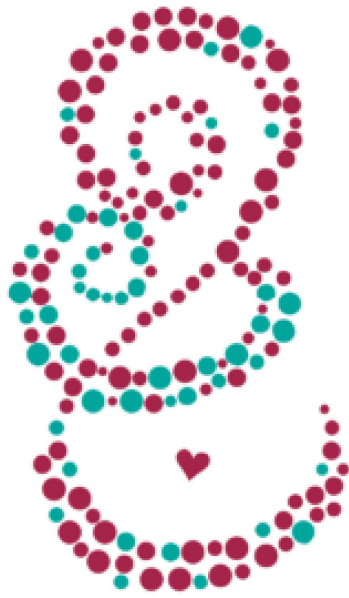

On Friday, May 24, 2019, DOH-Clay's School Health Program and the Community Health Program partnered with Grove Park Elementary (GPE) for a Bike / Walk to School Event. It was a successful educational opportunity for the GPE students to learn about bike safety. A total of 32 bike helmets were distributed to the students. The students were thrilled to receive their no cost helmets, as well as education on walking and bike safety.

- ◆ DOH-Clay partnered with Ascension St. Vincent's for the first annual Latch on Event.
- ◆ This event promoted breastfeeding as a standard method for feeding babies. As the Department of Health, we recommend breastfeeding for the best health outcomes of the mother and child.
- ◆ There are benefits to breastfeeding that last into adulthood.
- ◆ 13 women were in attendance who breastfed at the same time to be counted in the global latch on. 60,000+ people were in attendance around the world to either participate, volunteer or offer support.
- ◆ It was a great event and everyone who attended was able to enter a raffle for prizes.



Healthy Start

In July 2018, the **Coordinated Intake and Referral System** dub “**Community Connect**” was launched throughout Northeast Florida.

Clay County Community Connect, together with the Northeast Florida Healthy Start Coalition, created a local decision tree designed to streamline referrals to outside agencies and **eliminate duplication of services**.

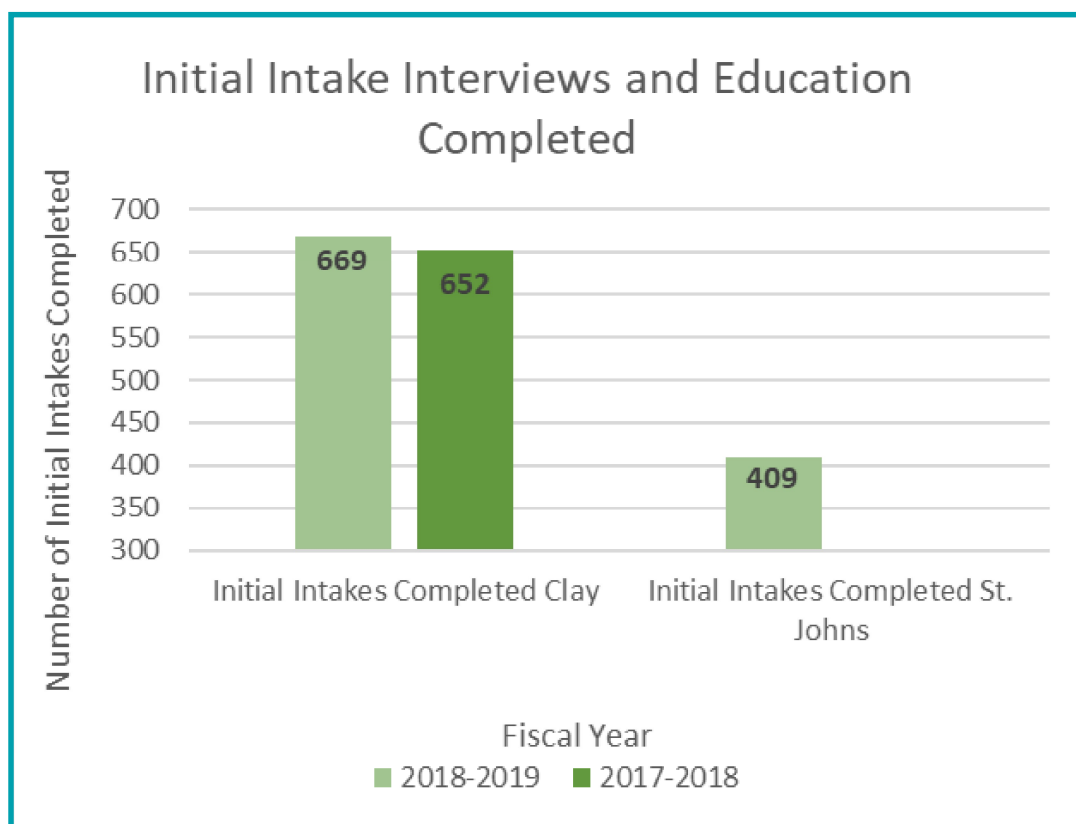


Staff were specially trained to process and triage **Healthy Start Prenatal Risk Assessment Inventory** (RAI) screen and complete **Initial Intake Interviews** on all pregnant, interconceptual and postpartum women who consented to services.

The interviews assessed and addressed the risks and needs of the clients.

Education was provided on:

- Healthy behaviors promoting positive childbirth outcomes
- Warning signs of Preterm Labor and Preeclampsia
- Safe Sleep practices and SIDS risk reduction
- Shaken Baby Syndrome Prevention
- Signs and Symptoms of Depression
- The importance of Breastfeeding and family planning



Staff coordinated home visitation services through risk-based referrals to Healthy Start, Nurse Family Partnership, Healthy Families and Early Head Start as appropriate.

In October 2018 DOH Clay began providing Coordinated Intake and Referral for St. Johns County Clients, providing a total of **669 Clay County** and **409 St. Johns County** pregnant women and new mothers with education, resources and linkages.

Healthy Start Care coordinators provided case management **tailored to the individual needs of each participant with emphasis on initiatives that promote safe sleep, parenting education, breastfeeding and smoking cessation**, at no cost to the client.

Healthy Start in Clay County completed **626 home visits**, with **79%** of Healthy Start clients **successfully completing** the Healthy Start program.

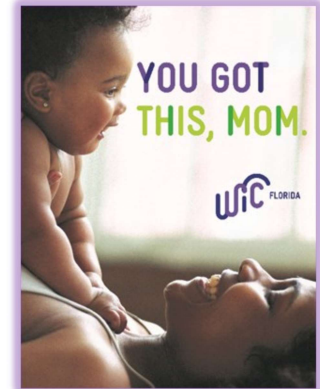

Women, Infants & Children (WIC)

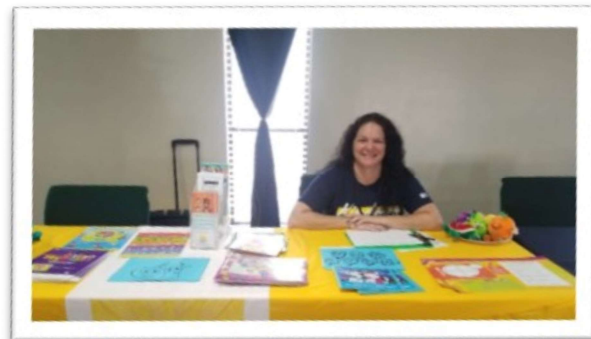

Emergency Preparedness

2018-19 Back to School Immunizations Drive

The agency implemented the Incident Command Structure (ICS) for the 3-week exercise at the Bear Run Clinic.

- ◆ 726 immunizations administered
- ◆ 463 required 680 forms completed
- ◆ 864 school aged children physically seen for services

Because of this exercise, our staff members were able to refamiliarize themselves with the internal workings of the ICS which is used during all deployments including response of Hurricane Michael in the Panhandle.

Hurricane Michael Deployment—Clay County

In October 2018, DOH-Clay monitored the anticipated Category 5 Hurricane Michael as it was anticipated to make landfall in the panhandle. Prior to the storm making landfall, a few individuals deployed to Bay county in preparation for the impact. After Hurricane Michael made landfall, the agency deployed additional teams throughout affected areas that included: Bay, Franklin, Gulf, Jackson, Leon, Taylor, and Wakulla counties as well as the State Emergency Operations Center (EOC). Altogether, DOH-Clay had 12 individuals that volunteered to deploy to help our fellow Floridians.

Statewide Deployable Numbers

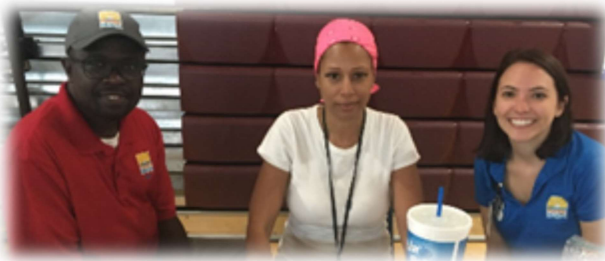
As a result of the required deployable personal that were identified during Hurricane Michael, the agency readdressed our local Emergency Duty Group policy. After multiple focus groups, the agency's Emergency Duty Group 1 grew from 24 individuals.

- ◆ All individuals are a deployable resource for emergencies out of their designated county of employment or out-of-state.



CDC Grant for SpNS Supplies

During the month of October 2018, the agency applied for a grant through the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) to augment the equipping of an additional Special Needs Shelter (SpNS). After the first of the year, we were granted an estimated \$26,000.00 to purchase additional cots, medical equipment, lights, and various equipment for the agency's SpNS cache. Not only is this equipment being used throughout Clay County, but it is also for possible deployment throughout the state.

DOH-Clay, Emergency Management, and the Clay County School District Training

In collaboration with the County Emergency Management, Clay County School District Administration, DOH-Clay assisted with the 2019 Part 2 District Training that involved a reunification tabletop exercise (TTX) at Ridgeview High School in Orange Park.

All administrators were in attendance for the 3-Part series that encompassed an active shooter scenario including the reunification of students and the behavioral health aspects that the students, parents, and school employees face if there is an active assailant incident in Clay County.

During this exercise, the focus was also put on the reunification process of students with parents and their obstacles.



Environmental Health Services

Partnering/Outreach

Clay EH continues our partnering with the Clay County Sheriff's Office in our ongoing quest to keep sharps out of the waste stream. This protects not only our county employees, but also keeps these items out of the environment.

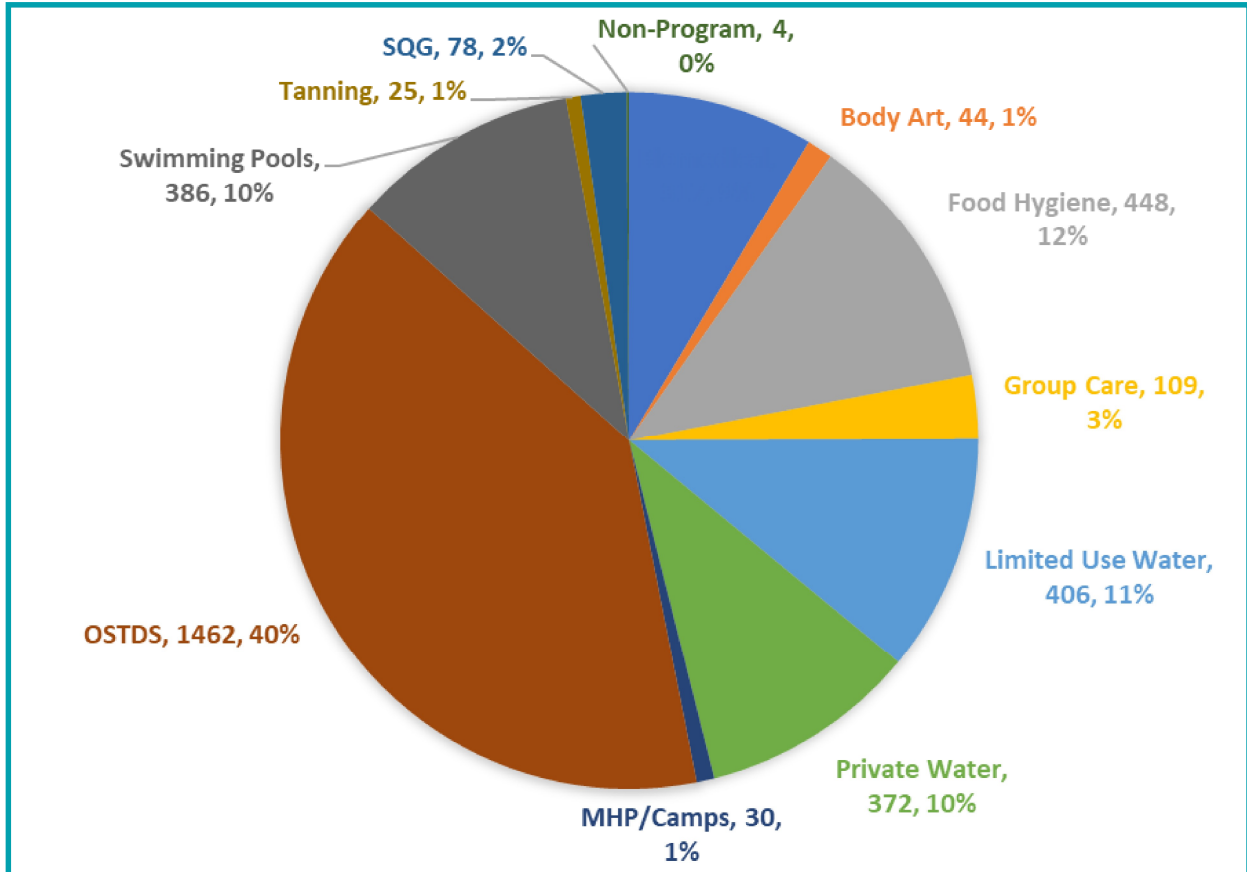
EH staff routinely meet with County Building and Zoning departments and Private partners to review proposed development projects, reviewing plans, and providing regulatory information to applicants.

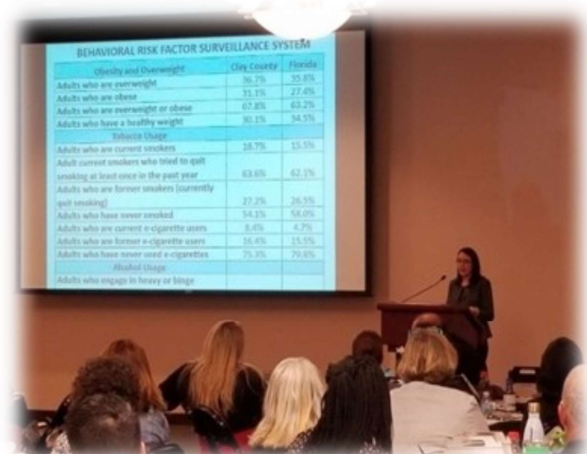
Community Health Assessment

On April 11, 2019 DOH-Clay and the Northeast Florida Health Planning Council hosted the Community Health Assessment (CHA) Preliminary Draft Release Meeting at Thrasher Horne-Center. There were over 50 community members in attendance from 20 different organizations across the county. Both primary and secondary health data was presented, which included 976 Community Health Surveys, 5 focus groups, and 11 Stakeholder Interviews. After review of data, the attendees selected the top three health priorities to be the focus of the 2019-2022 Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP). The selected priorities are listed below:

Healthcare Access
Disease Prevention & Lifestyle Behaviors

- ◆ Implementation of CHIP
