On December 19. 2014. two miles of CR 739 (Henley Road) were cleaned by six Department Of Health -Clay employees. This was the third of six planned clean-up events. Volunteers picked up eight bags of garbage weighing an estimated 40 pounds. Most of the garbage collected was alcoholic beverage containers (cans and bottles), cigarette butts, and fast food restaurant cups and wrappers.

Department of Health Clay County staff successfully participated in a statewide notification drill in December 2014. The current emergency notification system, called Everbridge, was used to test the staff's ability to respond to an unannounced alert notification. The alert was sent at 10:30 in the morning and staff had one hour to respond the alert. The health to department had an outstanding response rate of 93.4%. This test proves that

health department staff can receive and respond to emergency public health information at any time.

HEALTH SCREENING RESULTS NOW IN PARENT PORTAL

The School Health Team, in collaboration with Clav County School District Information Services. has been working make to students' health screening results more readily available to parents this school year. The integration of the entry of mass health screening data into the Clay County School District's Parent Portal of FOCUS, the district's student information system, has been a joint effort to streamline data entry and screening referral follow up. Mass health screenings are performed each year in the fall for the following students:

- Kindergarten Vision and Hearing
- 1st Grade Vision, Hearing, Height, Weight, and BMI
- 3rd Grade Vision, Height, Weight, and BMI
- 6th Grade Vision, Hearing, Height, Weight, BMI, and Scoliosis

Once mass health screenings are completed and entered by the school nurse, parents or guardians are able to access the results by logging into the Parent Portal at their convenience. Referral letters are sent home for students who did not pass any portion of the screening so that parents can then follow up with their child's healthcare provider. Mandatory health screenings are used to help identify any unknown or unrecognized health conditions which may interfere with а student's learning because we know that healthy students are better learners.

TECHNOLOGY FOR NEW PARENTS

Healthy Start is getting the word out to clients about text4baby.org. A free service, clients can download the app to their smart phone and be text messages sent with health tips about prenatal health. care, baby and parenting. There is also an option to get text reminders of upcoming doctor appointments.

Healthy Start workers are finding this to be a useful tool to promote maternal and child health among those that like to use technology. Available in Spanish and English, you can find more information at text4baby.org
