Message from Heather Huffman, MS, RDN, LD/N, IBCLC County Health Department Administrator



Dear Clay County Community Partners,

2020 and 2021 will certainly be one of the most memorable years of my professional career. I could not be more proud of the DOH-Clay team that I work with every day. I am also grateful for the support of community partners that we now know more than perhaps any of us would like, as we have continued to promote, protect, and preserve the public health of Clay County during the COVID-19 pandemic and now following the pandemic.

After the past 2 1/2 years here at the Department of Health, we are now taking a deep breath and re-focusing our efforts back on our core public health work that is essential to the overall health of our community.

2021-2022 Accomplishments:

- Administered 3,977 COVID-19 vaccinations.
- Hosted our annual Back to School Immunization Drive at the Clay County Fair Grounds, where our amazing staff was able to provide 685 vaccines to 669 clients for 2,108 services.
- Participated in several community health events throughout the county alongside multiple community partners which included: IMTF Community baby showers, Operation Barnabas, Pink Goes Red, Hammer and Hope, College Drive Food Truck Night, and the Clay County Overdose awareness seminar.
- Performed and issued 5,503 inspections and permits.
- And finally, we were able to relocate our Administration offices from Green Cove Springs to Fleming Island. We want to specifically thank the Board of County Commissioners for their continued support of public health.

Our staff, was able to once again get out in the community to conduct face to face education ranging from diabetes and unintentional injuries to confidential education for teens on all facets of public health. We provided education and information on health equity, inequities and disparities to DOH-Clay and our community partners and Task Force members. When the economic struggles began to impact our residents, our Women, Infant and Children (WIC) saw an increase of 14% participation in program service. This increase also resulted in approximately \$2.4 million of revenue into our county.

As we move forward into the next fiscal year, DOH-Clay's resolve will move towards new initiatives that focus on Health Equity, Age-Friendly Public Health Recognition Program, NACCHO Project Public Health Ready, and our continued efforts to build a sustainable Coordinated Opioid Recovery system of care. We will continue to meet the challenges of the ever-emerging communicable diseases from Hepatitis A to Meningococcal to Monkeypox.

I want to take this opportunity to send out a huge "Thank You" to all of our community partners from the hospitals and other healthcare entities, to nonprofit and other social service organizations, to the municipalities and the Board of County Commissioners for believing in our mission and the outstanding partnership that has allowed us to endure and prosper.

Information Technology

The IT department provides technical support for DOH-Clay and MQA Investigative Services Unit (Jacksonville) locations. The IT department assists DOH-Nassau as needed. The department is also tasked with ensuring compliance with data security standards and updating the internet and intranet web sites.

Facilities


Facilities is responsible for the upkeep of each building in Green Cove Springs, Bear Run Clinic, and now our new facility in Fleming Island. In addition they are responsible for managing our fleet of county vehicles. The facilities team has made and continues to make improvements to our buildings and address safety concerns.

Facilities has been a part of two Quality Improvement projects. One is a new ticket system for building or vehicle issues. The Facilities Manager will determine if an issue can be handled internally or if it needs to go to the county. If determined that it needs to go to the County, the Facilities Manager will submit a ticket to the County Building Maintenance Division to repair the issue. The second project measures the cleanliness of DOH-Clay assigned vehicles, which are graded by the Environmental Health Manager and the Facilities Manager. Facilities has also continued disinfecting and cleaning high-touch areas which includes the spraying of disinfectant in all our buildings. This has been going on since the start of the pandemic.



Fiscal & Budget

DOH-Clay is a state agency that relies on federal, state and local county government funding to help support our public health programs and services. Additional revenue is received through contracts and grants, state and county fees, and payments from Medicaid programs.

Clinical Services



The Clay County School Health Services Program is a collaborative partnership between the Florida Department of Health in Clay County (DOH-Clay) and Clay County District Schools (CCDS). CCDS supports one school nurse in every school. DOH-Clay is responsible for the administrative oversight of the program as per **Florida Statutes (F.S.) 381.0056**.

The Goal of the School Health Services Program is to ensure that students are healthy, in school and ready to learn. Services are provided in accordance with the local School Health Services Plan, which is jointly developed, biennially, by DOH-Clay, CCDS and the School Health Wellness Advisory Council (SHWAC).

The School Health Services Program provides basic school health services to all the students in the 43 public schools in Clay County. DOH-Clay also partners with the 22 private schools, ensuring school health immunization requirements for **F.S. 1003.22** are being met, as well as assisting with mandatory mass health screenings, as requested.

Health Screening

Vision, hearing, scoliosis and growth and development screenings are conducted in accordance with **Florida Statutes (F.S) 381.0056**. Vision and hearing impairment directly interfere with the learning process and is often detected during school screenings. A plan for follow-up is an essential component of the screening program. To comply with the 2021-2022 Scope of Work deliverables, two (2) attempts for follow-up are conducted, to notify the parent of any suspected abnormalities.

DOH-Clay provides testing and/or treatment services to persons infected with or suspected of being infected with an STD, to reduce the incidence of STD infections and prevent the development of disease related complications through early identification and treatment.

This past year, the STD program completed 13 outreach events, in a effort to educate the community partners and the public during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Vaccines required for school entry and recommended by the CDC are provided through the Vaccine for Children Program (VFC) from birth to 19 years of age.

Program 17 provides no cost vaccines to financially eligible uninsured or underinsured adults.

Hepatitis A shots are available at no cost for those in the exposure risk category.

Family Planning services include:

Teens may seek care with or without a parent or legal guardian. Confidential sexual health care is allowed via Federal law. Teen services are available with the following:



Primary Care

Services are provided to uninsured clients to improve their current health status and prevention of other health issues. Services include:

- ◆ Prescription Assistance Program—Available to assist in obtaining medications at reduced or no cost for up to 3 months.



STD screening and treatment is available by walk-in or appointments. Payment is requested at the time of service, but clients may be billed if unable to pay. Individuals who are contacts to a sexually transmitted disease may be screened and treated at no cost.





Program is a federally funded nutrition program that provides monthly healthy food packages, nutrition education and counseling, breastfeeding support, and referrals for health care and community services at no cost. The Clay County WIC Program has locations in Fleming Island, Orange Park, and Keystone Heights.

Community Outreach and Achievements

In July, Nicole and Kirsten attended the Back-to-School outreach event hosted by the Salvation Army.

In December, Amanda participated in a World AIDS Day outreach at Transformative Growth with River Region Human Services. This outreach provided free HIV testing, STI education and family planning.

For both events, WIC shared information on enrollment, health care referrals, education about breastfeeding, and nutrition.

- 2 staff passed the exam to become Certified Lactation Counselors
- 2 staff pursued their education and graduated with an Associate's degree and Master's degree

Emergency Preparedness



The agency once again implemented the Incident Command Structure (ICS) for the annual 2-week exercise at the Clay County Fair Grounds.

- ◆ 685 immunizations administered
- ◆ 549 required 680 forms completed
- ◆ 669 school aged children physically seen for services

Because of this exercise, our staff members were able to refamiliarize themselves with the internal workings of the ICS.

Overdose Data 2 Action (OD2A) and Community Paramedicine

DOH-Clay has made some great strides with the Overdose Data 2 Action (OD2A) Grant. The OD2A Task Force, which consists of over 100 community partners, meets monthly via a hybrid TEAMS/in person meeting that falls on the 3rd Wednesday of each month from 9am-10am. Since moving from Green Cove Springs to the new Fleming Island office, members are encouraged to join the meeting in person in our large conference room. The OD2A Prevention Coordinator facilitates these meetings and does regular Academic Detailing, visiting health care providers in Clay County to discuss OD2A and ensure best practices are being followed in regards to prescribing and treating patients with opioids. This involves distributing information on the PDMP (EFORCSE in Florida) and ensuring prescribers are checking for dangerous co-prescriptions, knowing how to identify if a patient may have a opioid use disorder (OUD) and how to best help them, safe tapering practices, naloxone co-prescriptions, and non-pharmacologic alternatives to opioids. Local providers have been very receptive to this information.

As part of the CDC's OD2A Grant, DOH works alongside Clay County Fire Rescue on the Community Paramedicine program. This program involves connecting people with OUD to CCFR for immediate medication assisted treatment, as well as a Recovery Peer Specialist with Clay Behavioral Health Center for a guiding hand in recovery. Once CCFR takes on a new client, Clay Behavioral Health Center schedules that client an initial appointment with their provider as well as a bio-psycho-social assessment with a LMHC in order to properly address the clients' specific needs before referring them to substance abuse treatment. The program has been very successful with 80 total client intakes in 2021 and 60 intakes in the first half of 2022.



DOH-Clay provided several educational presentations at Mission of the Dirt Road, which included information on tobacco and vaping prevention & cessation, COVID-19 and associated health disparities, diabetes, heart health, and healthy food and nutrition. Additional presentations included:

- Presentations at the Clay County Libraries on unintentional injuries (motor vehicle safety, falls, poisonings, drownings, suicide, including firearm safety), diabetes, and heart health
- Health education at Aging True which included diabetes, heart health, and unintentional injuries (motor vehicle safety, falls, poisonings, drownings, suicide, including firearm safety)
- Active parenting, family planning, healthy relationships, and STDs/HIV prevention at Clay County Jail.
- Confidential education for teens on healthy relationships, consent, STDs/HIV prevention, family planning, support, and vaping & tobacco prevention, including education on throat burns, nicotine addiction, and chemicals meant to be eaten, not inhaled.
- Education and information on health equity, health disparities, health inequities, and health inequalities to DOH-Clay and community partners.
- Vaping & tobacco prevention & cessation at School Health Wellness Advisory Council.

Health Equity

The Florida Department of Health's Office of Minority Health and Health Equity (OMHHE) works with government agencies and community organizations to address the barriers inhibiting populations from reaching optimal health.

A focus on health equity means recognizing and eliminating the systemic barriers that have produced disparities in achieving wellness.

DOH-Clay's Vision for Health Equity is **"For every Clay County resident to live as healthy as possible, without discrimination or prejudice, by improving healthcare delivery and health outcomes."**

Health Equity aims to reduce health disparities, health inequities, and health inequalities by addressing the social determinants of health (SDOH). A Health equity plan was created to prioritize reducing the prevalence and morbidities of Diabetes among those 65 years and above in the community.



Cross-sector collaborations and partnerships are essential components of improving health and well-being. DOH-Clay Health Equity team collaborated with community organizations to uncover the impact of education, health care access and quality, economic stability, social and community context, neighborhood and built environment, and other factors influencing the well-being of our community. Our community partners provide a wide range of expertise necessary to implement the Health Equity Plan.



Florida Department of Health's Healthiest Weight Initiatives have partnered with GO-NAPSACC and HEROs to provide technical assistance to local Early Childhood Educators (ECEs) to implement an evidence-based program for improving the health of young children by enhancing childcare program practices, policies, and environment.




Community Health Strategies

Environmental Health Services

EH Program is the regulatory branch of the Health Department. Our goal is to protect the health of the citizens through education and enforcement of public health laws. We continuously work with owners/operators to achieve compliance with all Statutory Laws and Administrative Rules.

2021/2022 was a challenging year for Clay EH due to an unprecedented staffing shortage that lasted several months. Along with COVID-19 still being present in the population, conducting mandated routine inspections became especially challenging. But, by December 2021, resources were restored. The office rallied, and with a “Risk based” focus, we prioritized inspections and completed our tasks.
